What?

As an infrastructure for Arts and Humanities researchers, DARIAH-EU promotes open access to methods, data, and tools in an effort to establish openness as a de-facto standard in digital research. Hence, it strives to ensure the highest standard of legal and ethical awareness.

The ELDAH portfolio encompasses issues of copyright and (open) licensing, data protection and privacy, openness in science and ethical scholarly conduct.

Who?

The ELDAH Working Group, founded in 2017, currently consists of more than 30 members drawn from 18 European countries and a large variety of disciplinary fields like literary and linguistic studies, historical studies, GLAM, creative industries, computer science and legal studies. Bringing experts from various arts and humanities research fields together with legal experts, ELDAH exemplifies the “by scholars for scholars” principle.



How?

ELDAH works in close collaboration with other groups among the large European research infrastructures, like the Legal and Ethical Issues Committee of CLARIN ERIC (CLIC), and pertinent working groups of national organisations, like the Open Science Network Austria (OANA), on developing recommendations that will transcend national and infrastructural boundaries.
